Discussion Questions:

- 1. How was Natasha's life the same as yours and how was it different?
- 2. Have you ever had to leave home for a very long period of time? How did you feel?
- 3. Is there ever a time when a child should turn in their parents to the legal authorities for something they did?

Jeopardy questions:

- COMMUNISM: The name Communists gave to people who thought individuals should own more things: "bourgeois attitudes"
